15. Course aims:

Acquiring fundamental insights into historical, artistic and literary styles, as well as periods, epochs i.e. formations; mastering concepts and terminology related to artistic and stylistic formations; identifying stylistic and poetic devices of an epoch through analysis of particular literary works.

16. Learning outcomes:

The students are expected to gain the knowledge which will enable them to independently identify and contextualize stylistic and poetic particularities of literary texts within historical succession of artistic epochs.

17. Course content:

18. Learning methods:

Lectures, practice, seminar papers (individual and group projects), quizzes. The course is delivered in line with the topics outlined and through an interactive approach which encourages students to consult the lecturer about each of the topics. Students are required to promptly complete all the assigned readings. Seminar papers/projects are to be original work and not to exceed 5 pages, (Times New Roman 12, spacing 1.5) and are to challenge and explore the topics, authors, literary phenomena, and particular texts from the syllabus. Students are encouraged to discuss with the Professor any perplexing issues regarding the course. Moreover, throughout the course, L and ACP assignments are to be prepared and announced prior to the date scheduled.

19. Assessment methods:

Written and oral methods are used to check gained knowledge. Written method encompasses writing tests/mini-exams after certain parts of curriculum are finished. Students can take the final exam even though if they did not take written mini tests or who have failed those. Grading system includes the following criteria:

1. Presence and activity at lectures and practice classes
2. Individual / group projects
3. quizzes
4. final exam

According to this list the professor will give points and form the final grade. Grading system and percentage of inclusion of certain activities as well as formation of final grade are shown in table below.

The table shows that continuous work by students during a semester enables students to gain 50 points which is 50% of total points while the other half can be obtained during final exam. From each activity students must obtain at least 50% of total number of points.

In order to become eligible to take the final exam, he/she must obtain at least 40% of total number of points.

During one semester, student can be absent from not more than 3 lectures.

If the students fulfills this condition, he/she can get a maximum of 30 points in one semester for being present and active in lectures. If being absent for 4-10 times from lectures at the end of semester, total number of points obtained in that semester will be decreased by one for each absence from lectures. This condition stimulates students to be present and take active part in lectures during whole semester. Higher number of absences will not be tolerated and in that case students will not be able to get professor's signature and verify semester.
