**15. Course aims:**

To acquire fundamental knowledge of the population as one of the elements of sociological analysis. To analyze demographic processes within the aspect of important social topics such as urbanization, modernization, social and professional mobility, education, healthcare etc. To monitor demographic development of the population in the world and in Bosnia and Herzegovina through numerous examples and concrete data. To become aware of the expert, scientific and methodological-didactic application of quantitative, graphical and other demographic methods of considering the layout, dynamics and partial population structure, and various techniques of future population trends.

**16. Learning outcomes:**

At the end of the course students will be able to independently use the available literature in order to solve various problems from the content of the course. They will be capable of solving problems of different complexity, both individually and in teams, as well as presenting them in a written or oral form with acquiring skills for practical problem solving which will result in the ability to pass a final exam at the first exam periods at the end of the semester.

Students will:

- acquire knowledge of the major theoretical concepts related to the population;
- be trained to independently interpret the findings of different studies on demographic phenomena and processes;
- be able to analyze and compare data from relevant sources such as census and population register, vital statistics, surveys, etc.
