To present the authentic socio-economic, cultural-traditional and historical characteristics of the overall structure and physiognomy of the Bosnian-Herzegovinian society;

To explain the "unity of diversity" of Bosnian-Herzegovinian society, which is made by an authentic socio-cultural and historical content.

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the course students will be able to independently use the available literature in order to solve various problems from the content of the course. They will be capable of solving problems of different complexity, both individually and in teams, as well as presenting them in a written or oral form with acquiring skills for practical problem solving which will result in the ability to pass a final exam at the first exam periods at the end of the semester.

- * Great-state ideologies and Bosnian-Herzegovinian society at the end of the 20th century
- * Stereotypes and prejudices in presenting the Bosniak nation
- * Political legal order of B&H today - Political transition of modern bh society
- * Economic transition of modern Bosnian-Herzegovinian society - Bosnian-Herzegovinian society and European integration -Bosnia and Herzegovina society and state in the process of globalization
