15. Course aims:

At the end of the semester, students, who have continuously performed their duties during the entire teaching period, will communicate in German, understand and analyze texts, and present ideas on issues from their profession, ie. in the field of international relations and diplomacy.

16. Learning outcomes:

1. Master the grammatical structures of the German language listed in the course content;
2. Master lexical structures in the field of international relations and diplomacy in the German language;
3. Actively apply knowledge, namely: writing, reading, understanding thematic units and conducting conversations in German in the professional field;
4. Compare the similarities and differences between the grammatical structures listed in the course content;
5. Analyze thematic units in German from the professional field;
6. Translate texts from German into Bosnian, Croatian, Serbian and vice versa.

17. Course content:

Professional terminology:
Basic concepts in international relations.
Comparing the state systems of Greece, Rome and the Islamic State.
State and rule.
Education.

18. Learning methods:

- Lectures with the use of multimedia tools;
- Interactive learning technique with active participation and discussion of students in lectures and exercises;
- Auditory exercises.
- Classes are conducted in German.

19. Assessment methods:

After half of the semester, students take the first written test, which includes the topics covered in the lecture. The test consists of multiple choice tasks, translation tasks, linking tasks, equivalent finding tasks in both languages. Tasks are scored depending on the type of task from 5 to 10 points. A student on the first test can achieve a maximum of 20 points. All students take the first test at the same time, which achieves uniformity of the level of knowledge being tested, as well as the conditions under which students take the test. At the end of the semester, students take a second test that covers the topics covered in the exercises. The test consists of multiple choice tasks, translation tasks, linking tasks, equivalent finding tasks in both languages. Tasks are scored depending on the type of task from 5 to 10 points. A student on the first test can achieve a maximum of 20 points. All students take the first test at the same time, which achieves uniformity of the level of knowledge being tested, as well as the conditions under which students take the test. Since the emphasis is on interactive learning, students are required to attend and actively participate in both lectures and exercises and thus win 10 points, of which 5 in lectures and 5 in exercises. The final exam is also written. All students have the right to take the final exam. The test consists of multiple choice tasks, translation tasks, linking tasks, equivalent finding tasks in both languages. Tasks are scored depending on the type of task from 5 to 10 points. A student on the final exam can achieve from 25 to 50 points. Tests on all forms of knowledge are recognized as a cumulative exam if the result achieved is positive after each individual test. In order to pass the course, a student must achieve a minimum of 54 cumulative points, of which a minimum of 25 points in the final written exam.
