**15. Course aims:**

Introducing students to the main philosophical currents of political philosophy. Rounding off the acquisition of knowledge on various political issues and categories that occupied philosophical discussions on issues of politics and political organization of the community, as well as pointing out the difficulties encountered by these discussions. Enabling students to critically judge the solutions offered in the various philosophical orientations that have dominated the history of political philosophy. Through teaching students basic concepts and theoretical concepts of political philosophy, through teaching and exercises, then students' insight into literature, the result will be the encouragement and development of intellectual skills in students in terms of critical thinking and social change, but also the application of acquired knowledge and skills specific social practice.

**16. Learning outcomes:**

At the end of the course, students will be able to independently use the available literature in order to solve various problems from the content of this course. Students will be able to solve problems of varying complexity, individually and in a team, and present them in written or verbal form and acquire skills for solving various problems in practice.

**17. Course content:**

- The emergence of the concept and subject of Political Philosophy. "Political morality" of ancient times: the unity of ethics and politics
  - The relationship between philosophy and politics. The ontological dimension of politics. Anthropological dimension of politics: man as a citizen of the polis and cosmopolis.
- Aristotle's and Plato's consideration of the form of government. The relationship between politics and religion. God's state versus the earthly state.
- Enlightenment-Reformation and Counter-Reformation. Locke's consideration of tolerance and liberalism
- Considerations on the relationship between the state, law and human freedom. Social contract, private property and civil society
  - Kant's theory of law and cosmopolitanism.
