15. Course aims:

- Acquisition and acceptance of basic knowledge about institutes of international public law, and
- Acquisition and development of skills and abilities that are a prerequisite for the study of modern international legal relations.

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the semester, successful students, who have continuously performed their duties throughout the academic period (semester), will be able to:

- Recognize the basic characteristics of the institute of international public law, and thus be included in the theoretical (but also practical) elaboration of the principles on which the system of international relations is based, and
- Analyze the advantages and disadvantages of the modern international legal system, and thus contribute to the creation and development of more favorable conditions for faster and more efficient inclusion of Bosnia and Herzegovina in global social flows.

18. Learning methods:

Lectures - interactive, during which the subject teacher requires maximum involvement of students in the discussion of the subject unit, and exercises (theoretical) - interactive which checks the success of students in the process of mastering previously processed teaching materials.

19. Assessment methods:

The student can collect a maximum of 100 points, 50 points during classes, whereby the previously mentioned activities are scored, and 50 points in the final (oral) exam. Written methods of knowledge assessment include knowledge tests through a colloquium, which is scheduled during classes in order to check the degree to which students have completed the planned (covered in class / exercises) teaching material. The oral method of knowledge assessment includes a discussion of important conceptual issues related to the subject matter, from the area that the student did not pass the colloquium. Colloquium: During the semester, after the "processing" of certain teaching units, a colloquium is planned, in the form of a test, in which the student can achieve a maximum of 20 points. In order for a student to pass the given teaching material, it is necessary to achieve at least 11 points in the colloquium. If the student has passed / colloqued the teaching material at the colloquium, at the final exam, which carries a maximum of 50 points, the student takes the remaining (unsatisfied) material. If the student has not passed the colloquium, the final part of the exam, which carries a maximum of 50 points, will include the complete teaching material.

20. Assessment components:

The grade on the exam is based on the total number of points earned by the student by fulfilling pre-exam obligations and taking the exam, and according to the quality of acquired knowledge and skills, and contains a maximum of 100 points and is determined according to the following scale:
