15. Course aims:

Recognize the importance of ethnic phenomena as a social and scientific problem. To enable students to get acquainted with ethnicity as a special form of sociability, above all, to get to know the complex structure of ethnic relations in Europe and the world. Introduce students to the relationship between nation and state, nation and culture in the modern world. Get to know the basic content of the origin and development of nations and national relations in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the course, students will be able to independently use the available literature in order to solve various problems from the content of this course. Students will be able to solve problems of varying complexity, individually and in a team and present them in written and verbal form and acquire skills for solving various problems in practice and will be able to pass the final exam in the first exam terms at the end of the semester.

17. Course content:

* Conceptual understanding of ethnic-national issues in the modern world and their interpretation in sociological theory.

* Ethnicity as sociability

* Nations, states and human community

* Ethnic-national structure of Europe

- Peoples of the Northern European Regional Belt

- The peoples of the northwestern continental area of Europe

- The peoples of the Alpine region

- The peoples of the western and middle Mediterranean

- Peoples of the Balkans

- The peoples of the northern Baltic, the Carpathian region, the Northern European lowlands and the Urals

* The peoples of Asia and Africa

- West Asia and North Africa: Islamic Empires and Modern Nations

- East Asia: empires, colonies and nations

- Africa: colonial empires, new states and new nations

* Scattered peoples: Roma, Jews and other diaspora communities

18. Learning methods:

In order to efficiently teach and achieve the set goals and learning outcomes of students during the course, the following teaching methods will be used:

- interactive lectures with the use of multimedia tools,
- exercises
- mini-tests.
- independent seminar papers.

19. Assessment methods:

The final written exam is preceded by pre-examination obligations: attendance at lectures and exercises, activities at lectures and exercises, seminar paper and mini-tests. From the pre-examination obligations, the student can achieve a maximum of 50 points. The student is obliged to regularly attend lectures (L) and exercises (E). During the semester, the student can miss a maximum of three times from lectures and three times from exercises. In case the student could not attend a certain number of classes due to illness or other justified reasons, he is obliged to compensate them in agreement with the subject teacher and assistant and to perform the missing obligations through independent work within a certain period, in consultation with the subject teacher or assistant. For continuous attendance and activity in the classroom (lectures and exercises) throughout the semester, the student can achieve a maximum of 15 points. For the done and presented independent-seminar work, the student can achieve from 0 to 5 points. During the semester, students will be given to solve two mini-tests. The aim of these tests is to prepare students for the final exam throughout the semester by testing their knowledge. Students will be notified of test dates at least 15 days in advance. The maximum number of points that a student can achieve on the tests is 30 points. This opens the possibility that the student can win a maximum of 50 points from pre-examination obligations. After completing the pre-examination obligations and completing the classes in the first semester, the final exam consists of a written test of students' knowledge. The maximum number of points that a student can achieve in the final written exam is 50 points.

20. Assessment components:

- a) attendance and activity in classes (L-8) + (E-7) 15
- b) mini tests (2x15) 30
- c) independent seminar paper 5
- d) final-written exam 50

Total possible: 100

Assignment of grades is done on the basis of achieved results - points won, from pre-exam and exam obligations.

Number of points and final grade: 0 -53 five (5), 54-63 six (6), 64-73 seven (7), 74-83 eight (8), 84-93 nine (9), 94-100 ten (10).
