15. Course aims:

To enable students to understand the importance of knowledge of international relations and thus the connection of Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations. To know the position of Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations until 1992, from 1992 to 1995, and from 1995 until today. To know Bosnia and Herzegovina's relations with the United Nations, the European Union, NATO, the United States, financial and other institutions.

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the semester, successful students, who have continuously performed their duties throughout the teaching period, will be able to fully master issues related to Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations from the earliest times to 2018.

17. Course content:

- Tasks of studying the subject Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations;
- Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations until 1992;
- Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations from 1992 to 1995;
- Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations from 1995 to the present: Bosnia and Herzegovina and the United Nations, Bosnia and Herzegovina and the European Union, Bosnia and Herzegovina and the NATO Pact, Bosnia and Herzegovina and the United States, Bosnia and Herzegovina and international financial institutions, Bosnia and Herzegovina and other international organizations.

18. Learning methods:

In order to efficiently teach and achieve the expected goals of the subject, different curricula will be used methods: oral presentation, deduction, induction, analysis, synthesis, data comparison, etc.

19. Assessment methods:

Students receive up to 7 points for attending lectures, and also up to 7 points for attending exercises. For the activity in teaching: discussions, questions, etc., the student can get up to 6 points. A student can win up to 10 points for an independent seminar paper. In addition, two colloquial exams will be organized during the semester. On them, students can win up to 20 points (2X10).

The first colloquium will be organized when the following topics are covered: - Tasks of studying the subject Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations; - Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations until 1992; - Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations from 1992 to 1995;

The second colloquium will be organized when the following topics are covered: - Bosnia and Herzegovina in international relations from 1995 to date: Bosnia and Herzegovina and the United Nations, Bosnia and Herzegovina and the European Union, Bosnia and Herzegovina and the NATO pact, Bosnia and Herzegovina and the United States, Bosnia and Herzegovina and international financial institutions, Bosnia and Herzegovina and other international organizations.

The final exam consists of a written and an oral knowledge test. On the written test, a student can win up to 20 points, and on the oral test, up to 30 points, which is a total of 50 points. The written exam consists of a test with five questions that carry four points each, while in the oral exam students answer three questions that carry 10 points each.

20. Assessment components:

Attendance at lectures brings up to 7 points; attendance at exercises up to 7 points, class activity up to 6 points, seminar paper up to 10 points, first colloquium up to 10 points, second colloquium up to 10 points. A student can win up to 50 points within the pre

- examination obligations. With exam obligations the student can win up to 50 points:
- up to 20 points on the written part of the exam- up to 30 points on the oral part of the exam

Assignment of grades based on the number of points achieved:
up to 53 = 5; 54-63 = 6; 64-73 = 7; 74-83 = 8; 84-93 = 9; 94-100 = 10
