15. Course aims:

Introduce students to the history of turkology and introduce them to the achievements, tasks and scientific methods of Turkology studies: the earliest European schools, diplomatic academy and chair of the Turkish language, development of European Turkology studies in the 19th and 20th century and also achievements and prospects of contemporary Turkology studies.

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the semester students who acquainted themselves with the course outline and its objectives and completed course requirements should be able to categorize basic characteristics of diplomatic missions to Istanbul and Rumeli, analyze the most important works of European Turkology regarding Ottoman Turkish language and Turkish people, and to distinguish various teaching methodologies of Turkology.

17. Course content:

Definition and the outline of the course: The earliest European and American schools, Development of European Turkology studies in the 19th century, Development of European Turkology studies in the 20th century, Turkology in Europe today, Turkology in America today, Turkology today in Turkey, Achievements and prospects of contemporary Turkology studies.

18. Learning methods:

Classes are held using various multimedia teaching aids, active study and active participation of students in the teaching process. Various types of written assignments (essays, papers, seminars, etc.) as homework, in-class activities.

The language of instruction is Bosnian and Turkish.

19. Assessment methods:

Over the semester, students produce two written assignments (essays) and take the final exam on a given topic. For each of the written assignments, students can earn a maximum of 20 points. For continued active in-class participation over the semester students can earn a maximum of 10 points. Test points are calculated into the final grade if students earn at least 10 points per test.

The final exam is taken in the written form. It includes the topics covered over the semester, both in the lectures and practice classes. The maximum number of points that each student can earn is 50. In order to pass the final exam, students are required to earn at least 25 points.

20. Assessment components:

Pre-exam points amount to a maximum of 50 points and the maximum number of points that can be earned on the final exam is 50. Pre-exam points include two test over the semester, each earning a maximum of 20 points, attendance and in-class active participation for which students can earn a maximum of 10 point. This amounts to a total of 100 points (50+40+10).

The minimum number of points required to pass an exam is 54:

54-63=6 (six)

64-73=7 (seven)

74-83=8 (eight)

84-93=9 (nine)

94-100=10 (ten)

with 6 being the lowest and 10 being the highest grade.
