15. Course aims:

The study of Turkish and Bosniak epic. Analysis and study of Turkish epics before accepting Islam. The study of folklore in Turkish Literature after embracing Islam. Analysis and study of oral tradition in Bosniak literature. The place and role of popular culture in the development of a nation.

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the semester / course successful students, who during the entire teaching period continuously perform their obligations, they will be able to rule:

- General information about the Turkish Destan before embracing Islam;
- General information on the folk tradition in Turkish Literature after embracing Islam;
- General information on the folk tradition in Bosniak literature.

17. Course content:

Role of folk culture in developing nation.

Myth, mythology, epic, legend.

A mix of oral and written literature.

Turkish epics before Islam. Poem of Ergenekon. Poem of Oguz-Han.

Ballad and romance in Bosniak literature. Hasanaginica. The Ballad of Omer and Merima.

Examples of the Turkish and Bosnian mythology.

The emergence sevdalinka in B&H.

Prose genres of folk literature.

Legends about the Ottoman conquest of Bosnia. about Saints.

Types of Turkish folk songs.

18. Learning methods:

Classes are held using various multimedia teaching aids, active study and active participation of students in the teaching process. Various types of written assignments (essays, papers, seminars, etc.) as homework, in-class activities.

The language of instruction is Turkish.

19. Assessment methods:

Over the semester, students produce two written assignments (essays) and take the final exam on a given topic. For each of the written assignments, students can earn a maximum of 20 points. For continued active in-class participation over the semester students can earn a maximum of 10 points. Test points are calculated into the final grade if students earn at least 10 points per test.

The final exam is taken in the written form. It includes the topics covered over the semester, both in the lectures and practice classes. The maximum number of points that each student can earn is 50. In order to pass the final exam, students are required to earn at least 25 points.

20. Assessment components:

Pre-exam points amount to a maximum of 50 points and the maximum number of points that can be earned on the final exam is 50. Pre-exam points include two test over the semester, each earning a maximum of 20 points, attendance and in-class active participation for which students can earn a maximum of 10 point. This amounts to a total of 100 points (50+40+10).

The minimum number of points required to pass an exam is 54:

54-63=6 (six)

64-73=7 (seven)

74-83=8 (eight)

84-93=9 (nine)

94-100=10 (ten)

with 6 being the lowest and 10 being the highest grade.
