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15. Course aims:

- to enable students to communicate in English at pre-intermediate level
- to enable students to understand the selected audio and written texts, to discuss and write about topics covered in the class, and to express their ideas on the topics related to their field of studies.
- to enable students to appropriately use grammatical structures covered in the class
- to enable students to appropriately use vocabulary covered in the class

16. Learning outcomes:

At the end of the semester, successful students who continuously performed their tasks will be able to:

- appropriately use grammatical structures covered in the class
- appropriately use lexical structures covered in the class
- actively apply the knowledge they gained during the course including knowledge on reading, writing, listening and speaking.
- express themselves in writing and speaking in a competent way.

- Week 1 - Introduction to the course

- Week 6 - Society and Family, expressing opinion
- Week 7 - TEST
- Week 8 - Science, modal verbs (should, must, have to)
- Week 9 - Science, famous (Turkish) scientist; modal verbs (had to and could)
- Week 10 - Science; nouns, adjectives and verbs with prepositions; developing an argument
- Week 11 - The Night, verb patterns
- Week 12 - The Night, the economy of Turkey, fixed expressions
- Week 13 - The Night, -ing/-ed adjectives
- Week 14 - TEST
- Week 15 - Revision

18. Learning methods:

Classes are held using

- various multimedia teaching aids and active study, with active participation of students in the teaching process
- group/pair work
- the language of instruction is English

19. Assessment methods:

Over the semester, students are obliged to take two tests (written and/or spoken), one after half of the semester and one at the end of the semester. For each of the tests, students can earn a maximum of 20 points. Test points are calculated into the final grade if students earn at least 10 points per test. For continued active in-class participation over the semester students can earn a maximum of 10 points.

The final exam is taken in the written form. It includes the topics covered in lectures over the semester. The maximum number of points that each student can earn is 50. In order to pass the final exam, students are required to earn at least 25 points and to pass the course they need to accumulate at least 54 points.

20. Assessment components:

Pre-exam points amount to a maximum of 50 points and the maximum number of points that can be earned on the final exam is 50. Pre-exam points include two tests over the semester, each earning a maximum of 20 points and attendance and in-class active participation for which students can earn a maximum of 10 point. This amounts to a total of 100 points (50+40+10).

The minimum number of points required to pass the course is 54:

54-63=6 (six)

64-73=7 (seven)

74-83=8 (eight)

84-93=9 (nine)

94-100=10 (ten)

with six (6) being the lowest and ten (10) being the highest grade.
