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**15. Course aims:**

The aim of the course is for students to get acquainted with forensic basics, content and methods of work in the field of judicial medicine, to the extent that they can understand the medical and social significance of this medical discipline.

The aim of the course is to get acquainted with the applicable legal regulations, in particular in the field of expert medical expertise and the field of expertise.

**18. Learning methods:**

Teaching methods are:

Interactive, theoretical and practical teaching,

Work in small groups,

For practical teaching methods will be used: concrete experience, PBL (problem based learning), consultation Lectures with the use of multimedia resources with active participation of students.

Within the anticipated number of hours, the forms of continuous examination of the knowledge (practical exam, partial exam 1 part) will be held. Preparation and presentation of group and individual seminar papers.

**19. Assessment methods:**

1. TEST 1 - First Colloquium (50% of the subject matter) - 30 points

2. TEST 2 - final exam (total grade) - 50 points

3. LECTURE - active participation - 5 points

4. Attendance attendance - 5 points

4. EXERCISES - seminar work, case study - 10 points

Preliminary activities and the first colloquium carry 50 points The final exam carries 50 points.

A practical exam is passed for the final exam entry.

The final exam is placed orally.

In order for a student to pass a course, they must have a minimum of 54 cumulative points of which a minimum of 25 points on the final exam.

If an undergraduate student is overwritten, he will be immediately absent from the exam, and his work will not be evaluated, followed by taking appropriate measures in accordance with legal decisions.

**20. Assessment components:**

The total number of points earned, obtained through all forms of knowledge, is translated into the final grade as follows:

- 10 (A) - (remarkable success with slight mistakes), 93-100 points
- 9 (B) - (above average, with a few mistakes), 83-92 points
- 8 (C) - (average, with noticeable mistakes), 73-82 points
- 7 (D) - (generally good, but with significant disadvantages), 63-72 points
- 6 (E) - (meets the minimum criteria), 53-62 points
- 5 (F) - (does not meet the minimum criteria and requires slightly more work)
