15. Course aims:

- Introducing and understanding the essence of the personality rights;
- Enabling students to analyze and properly implement the provisions of national and international character that regulate the violation of personal rights,
- Acquisition of the necessary knowledge and skills which students need in order to resolve the possible cases concerning the violation of the rights of personality.

16. Learning outcomes:

- Enabling students for successful mastering of cases relating to the violation of personal rights at the national and international level;
- Comparing the institution of individual rights in Bosnia and Herzegovina with the respective institutes of comparative and EU Law;
- Understanding the hierarchy and mutual relationships of legal sources concerning the personality rights as well as their successful use in the context of solving practical cases;
- Analysis of national and foreign court decisions in the field of personal ity rights;
- Case study based on the examples concerning the violation of the rights of personality.

17. Course content:

- The concept and definition of personality rights;
- The personality rights as part of a system of civil law;
 - The personality rights and immaterial damage;
 - Historical development of personality rights;
 - Development of personality rights in BH;
 - The main legal problems in the structuring of personality rights;
 - Types of personality rights;
 - Private International Law Aspect of Personality Rights,
 - Legal regulation of personality rights in the legislation in BH.

18. Learning methods:

Lectures: interactive, with the maximum involvement of students in the discussion of all the issues concerned.

19. Assessment methods:

In the second half of the semester students are supposed to write colloquium which includes previously treated topics on lectures and exercises. Colloquium consists of 15 questions. Each correct answer scored 1 point, respectively, which means that student at the colloquium can achieve a maximum of 15 points. As part of the pre-exam obligations, students are required to make individual or group seminar paper concerning topics from the contents of the subject. Seminar paper is to be submitted in writing to the teacher for review and evaluation, and then presented orally. In the preparation and presentation of the group seminar paper, all students from the group are to be engaged equally, whose participation is valorized individually. For the finished and presented seminar, student can achieve from 0 to 15 points. Also, for continuous interactive role during the lectures and exercises throughout the semester, the student can achieve from 0 to 10 points.

The final exam is oral.

At the oral exam students answer three questions from the program/content of the course. Oral exam is considered to be passed if a student gives at least partial answers to all three questions. At the oral exam student can achieve 50 points.

In order for the student to pass the exam, he/she must achieve a minimum of 54 cumulative points of which a minimum of 20 points at the final oral exam.

20. Assessment components:

Exam grade is based on the total number of points a student achieves by completing pre-exam requirements and oral exam, according to the quality of the acquired knowledge and skills, contains a maximum of 100 points, and is determined according to the following scale:
