15. Course aims:

It is studying as one of the fundamental phenomena of human society at all stages of its development. Whether the word about the security of an individual, a state, a group of states, or an intergroup community is always about trying to ensure the values and condition that are considered to be of vital importance. For this reason, the underlying categories will be studied: the notion of security, type of security, security mechanisms, threats, comparative security systems and security component components.

16. Learning outcomes:

Students acquire basic knowledge of the concept, content and types of security, and learn more about concepts and thoughts on the notion of national security. Students develop the ability to understand basic concepts that dominate the modern security content as well as the knowledge required to analyze specific national security support. Students have an obligation to explore one of the topics and to be presented in the presentation, which follows their ability to analyze and understand the problem or its specific segment.

17. Course content:

Introduction to Security Studies, Concept of Security Studies - Past, Present and Future
Intuition in International Politics - Traditional Approaches, Peace Studies, Ljudska sigurnost - Children and War,
Securitization - Migration, Military Security, Security Regime, Social Security
Security, Economic Security, Role of Intelligence Activities in National Security, Mass Destruction Weapons,
Terrorism, Transnational Crime.

18. Learning methods:

Lectures using multimedia tools, active learning techniques and active participation and discussion of students
Simulation of decision making process in municipal councils
Simulation of the relationship between organs, citizens, public services, non-governmental organizations

19. Assessment methods:

Analysis of concrete cases from practice (students will choose a concrete case from the practice that will analyze critically to discuss with the teacher and give a conclusion with a meticulous view of solving that question).
Seminar work (the student will choose, in agreement with the lecturer, one topic that will assimilate the legal theoretical international legal comparative and experiential aspect).
Research work (the student will choose, in agreement with the lecturer, one topic that will explore collective rights and analyze critically observe and draw conclusions from their own observations of research results).

20. Assessment components:

The assessment of the exam based on the total number of points the student has obtained by fulfilling the pre-requisites and passing the exam and it contains a maximum of 100 points and is determined according to the following scale:

- attendance at lectures - 5 points.
- student activity - 5 points.
- seminar work - 20 points.
- research work - 20 points.
- analysis of concrete cases from practice - 20 points.
- Final Examination - 30 points.
