15. Course aims:

The curriculum is designed in order to realize the following objectives:

- to enable students to acquire legal concepts, and develop the capacity for understanding, analyzing and drafting legal texts and documents in German
- to acquaint students with the strategies and techniques of integrated language skills (reading, listening, writing and oral communication) through linguistic system upgrade
- mastering and improving communication skills in German
- improvement of legal skills and orientation in the legal terminology of the German language

16. Learning outcomes:

After completion of lectures and success of completed tasks and exercises, students will be able to:

- identify the major structural elements of the original document (contracts, judgments, etc.).
- compare various provisions of legislation drawn up in German with the provisions of the BiH law
- apply appropriate professional terminology in German for a particular area of law
- develop the ability of oral and written expression in German
- explore sources in German
- apply the acquired language skills of reading, listening, understanding and writing formal letters

17. Course content:

The focus of the course "German language for Lawyers III" is on mastering basic professional terminology and more accurately using the grammatical structures of the German legal language. In this way, students will gain the ability to independently read and understand literature and to talk about the basic legal issues. Introduction to the civil law of Germany; the capacity to have the BGB; Austrian lease agreement; killing contract on the basis of error; tort liability under Swiss law; Divorce in Switzerland; European Law: Sources of Community law, EU institutions, creating internal market in the case of free movement of goods; law firms in Germany; establishment of employment under Austrian law.

18. Learning methods:

This course is planned to include the following activities for learning: observation and reflection, and creation of abstract concepts. As learning styles are preferred: visual, auditory, social and independent style. The most significant learning methods in the course are:

- Lectures using multimedia means, active learning techniques with the active participation and discussion of students;
- Preparation and presentation of seminar papers. The teaching is based on the fundamental principles of interactive teaching
